What Lent Means to Me

We are in the final days of Lent. Holy Week gives us the opportunity to experience a wide range of emotions. On Palm Sunday we celebrate the triumphant entry into Jerusalem with the waving of palms and joyful processing. As the week moves on, the tone becomes appropriately sombre. Maundy Thursday services are the ones that especially have moved me. With the commemoration of the Last Supper and the symbolic washing of the feet or hands, we remember Jesus' time with his followers and the origins of the Eucharist. At the end of the service we face the fear and fright of the arrest and the crucifixion that will follow. The Altar is stripped, the Cross is covered in black, and the Church is put in darkness. On Good Friday the feeling is one of deep sadness, as we re-enact the final hours. We look forward to celebrating the wondrous joy of Easter.
