

UKRAINIAN RELIEF WORK

There are many ways to support Ukraine and Ukrainians suffering from an unjust war in their homeland.

One avenue of support through the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF), an arm of the national Anglican church, which is supporting Ukrainians forced to flee their homes due to the Russian invasion. PWRDF has granted \$50,000 to fund the work of Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA).

As the war began on February 24, tens of thousands of Ukrainians fled for safety elsewhere in Ukraine or to neighbouring countries. HIA has been working in Ukraine for more than 25 years in humanitarian and

development projects. It had already shipped 28 tons of food to support those fleeing to Hungary, and their staff have been working with refugees at the Ukraine/Hungary border.

On February 27, HIA set up a 24-hour refugee support point on the Hungarian side of the border at Beregsurány, where the line of refugees trying to cross into Hungary is kilometres long, says an ACT communiqué.

Another support point was set up in a heated pavilion 4 km away in Asztély, Ukraine, near the border crossing. More tents and mobile toilets will be added in the coming days. HIA provides hot tea, sandwiches, refreshments, blankets and basic hygiene items for Ukrainians, including many elderly and children waiting long hours to cross the border into Hungary.

In addition to the tangible help at the support point, HIA also helps those arriving with information in Hungarian and Ukrainian, including how those in need can get temporary accommodation in Hungary. There is also support from local volunteers, such as a nearby Serbian bakery which is providing fresh bread, made with flour donated from Hungary.


Come and join us for our virtual Coffee hour on Sunday March 27th at 1:00 p.m.

I have been a "cradle Anglican" since 1930. I recall attending church with my Mother in the portable church at the back of the property. Rev. Claud Secrett was the rector and I remember a very special Sunday School service directed by him. The building of the new church began in the 1930s.

The basement was completed when the war broke out and all construction was halted so a ceiling was put in the basement so we could hold services there. It was a large space where so many activities took place e.g.: brownies, guides, scouts, AYPA, bazaars, concerts etc.

The picture in this week's bulletin reminded me of the sanctuary where I sat in the junior choir. Many children attended Sunday School at 3 pm. every week. Molly Secrett was one of my teachers. She was very lovely. She

had a brother—Victor. Rev. Secrett joined the army during the war so we had a replacement—Canon MacTeer. He taught us confirmation classes. His classes were very long—as I recall.

We had good times in the basement church. Our Sunday School picnics were always held at Centre Island. Some of us had to go by trolley and streetcar. We had games, swam in cold Lake Ontario and had lots to eat. I can't remember how the food got there.

I met my best friend, Pat Aspery, at Sunday School. Pat married a local boy, Charles (Bud) Ellis on Dec. 1St, 1950. Their wedding was the last one in the basement church. Pat and I are both widows now living in Sr. Residences. Pat is in Barrie and I am in Gravenhurst. I entered nursing school so was away for a while but my family was still in Willowdale on Ellerslie Ave. I met my future husband, Ted, around this time and together we attended St. Paul's Church Toronto on Sunday evenings.

We ended up back at St. George's when Canon John Thompson was the rector. He baptized and confirmed Ted the year before he married us in the new church on April 24th, 1954. Peter Bradshaw was the organist. We bought a house in Agincourt but stayed with St. George's Church for a few more years. Our first two children were baptized there by Canon Thompson. He was an amazing man. I feel so honoured to be around for St. George's 100th anniversary. Our retirement years were spent at our cottage in Bala where Ted was a Diocesan Lay Reader. Our church Trinity All Saints is also celebrating its' 100th this year----quite an historic year for me. I am looking forward to meeting you on April 23rd---the day before my 68th anniversary of my wedding day at St. George's Willowdale.

ONGOING REMINDERS

TERRITORIAL ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

This is the Land Acknowledgement that has been adopted by St. George on Yonge:

The land on which we gather is the traditional territory of the Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee (ho-den-oh-shownee) and Anishinabek (ah-nish-nah-bek) Nations, and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. This territory was the subject of the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Iroquois Confederacy and the Ojibwe and allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. This territory is also covered by the Toronto Purchase. Today, Toronto is home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island.

We recognize the enduring presence of Indigenous peoples connected to and on this land. We are grateful for the opportunity to gather on this territory and work in this community, and we commit ourselves to the work of reconciliation with Indigenous peoples.

\$TEWARD\$HIP

As we move into the season of Spring, with its promise of re-growth and new life, let us remember that the church is opening up again after a long 'winter' of pandemic and shutdown. Both the earth and the church need our stewardship at this fragile time.

Throughout the pandemic, St. George on Yonge maintained two weekly worship services, in person and/or virtual, continued to provide pastoral support that people relied on, and programs and services virtually, including adult religious education, church school and ESL sessions. This continued in spite of a sharp drop in income, both parishioner donations and income from building users, as ordained and lay staff and a small group of volunteers continued to deliver above and beyond the call of duty. The income shortfall is a major concern; needed maintenance and repairs can't be done because of a shortage of income, and some programs and services needed for the parish to grow cannot be funded.

St. George, like every congregation, counts on members to be generous with gifts of time, talent and treasure, so the parish and its work can flourish in this 'spring time', this time of re-birth after the pandemic, and especially as this is the parish's 100th anniversary year.

Please think about your gift to St. George in a very intentional and prayerful way. The note below on 'Donation Options' has useful information to help you with your decision.

DONATION OPTIONS

 PAR (Pre-authorized Remittance) is the ideal way to support the parish financially. If you are not already 'on PAR', please seriously consider this method of intentional giving, using safe, secure and automatic debit; it's very flexible and you can change or withdraw your commitment at any time. Commit to a manageable amount, and if you can offer more, place additional donations on the offertory plate on Sunday mornings. - Cheques can be mailed or dropped off at the Church in person. The Office Administrator is at the church on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays during office hours to accept your cheques or even good old-fashioned cash! Please phone or email to set up a time to drop of your donation.
- At Sunday services, the offering plate remains on a table at the Sanctuary entrance rather than being passed around, due to COVID protocols. Please place your donation as you enter for worship.
- Donations can also be made online with a credit card through CanadaHelps (there is a service charge to the parish, but all donations are gratefully received).





Do you have old eye glasses lying around that no one is using and don't know what to do with them? We have your solution. If you drop them off at the church Doug Heyes has a location that takes donated glasses. After they sanitize the glasses they are donated to developing countries. You can bring them to church once we resume in-person services, or drop them off in the mail box by the Yonge street entrance. Please put a note with them that they are being donated.

Thank you for the many pairs of eyeglasses already donated. If the desire to support those in developing countries continues, more deliveries will be made, so keep them coming. **64** pairs to date have been donated!

HOW TO BOOK A COVID-19 VACCINE

HOW TO DOWNLOAD ONTARIO'S NEW COVID-19 VACCINE PASSPORT OR QR CODE

To access the QR code, go to Ontario's **COVID-19 vaccination record site**, enter your health card information, date of birth and postal code. When you get to the next page, select 'proof of vaccination'. Then, select 'Download your enhanced vaccine certificate'. This should be followed by another screen pop-up that will display the QR code. The code will be labelled with your full name, date of birth and the dates of your vaccinations as well as the types of vaccines you received.

You can print out the QR code document if you prefer carrying it physically, but make sure not to fold or crease the QR code portion as it may become difficult to read. You can also store the code in your smartphone as a PDF by emailing it to yourself.

If you're an iPhone user, you can save it to your Apple Health app by opening your camera and hovering over the QR code. When your phone scans the code, it'll open up the document that you can save on your app.

If you received one or more of your doses of the COVID-19 vaccine outside of Ontario, the government says you must contact your local public health unit for proper documentation. The province says that "proof of vaccination may also include a vaccination receipt from another jurisdiction that shows the holder is fully vaccinated against COVID-19."

If you aren't vaccinated or are only partially vaccinated, Ontario says you won't be able to enter businesses and organizations where proof of vaccination is required. This includes indoor dining at restaurants, gyms, theatres, sports and entertainment venues and other non-essential businesses. The same site for downloading your enhanced vaccine certificate can also be used to book your vaccine appointment.

With the necessity of wearing masks, if you are using disposable ones, please cut the elastic/ribbons before disposing of them properly; some ribbons can simply be pulled free of the mask. Animals, birds, fish, etc. can get caught up in the elastic. Don't forget to cut the plastic rings of can holders too. Please say no to plastic straws... there are many alternatives out there now. And please use reusable bags when possible.
